




WITH ALMOST 300 DAYS OF SUN EACH

year and temperatures that rarely dip below the high 60s, the greater Phoenix area is a fresh-air utopia. It's no wonder that residents place outdoor living and entertaining spaces at the top of their must-have lists when building a new house. But even in a town where alfresco dinner parties and poolside gatherings are de rigueur everywhere from historic downtown bungalows to luxury mountainside estates, once in a rare while a home comes along that elevates hosting to new levels.

When Nancy and Lee Hanley decided to build their dream home in Paradise Valley, one of their requirements was that it be not just somewhere to live but also a place to hold everything from intimate soirces to large functions.

The library with its rich, knotty alder-clad walls, bookcases and coffered ceiling, plush furnishings and antique rug provides a sumptuous, masculine flair. Custom millwork frames a large painting that homeowners Lee and Nancy Hanley purchased at auction.





Modeled after a Scottish conservatory, the dining room seats up to 12. "We wanted that garden feel," says interior designer Donna Vallone. "The only difference is that a true conservatory would have a glass ceiling." The chairs, which were refinished and reupholstered, were found by Vallone and homeowner Nancy Hanley during a shopping trip for antiques in New Orleans.



"When Lee and I were discussing what we envisioned and how we wanted to use our home, in addition to having family gatherings and room for everyone to stay here, we wanted to be able to host events for philanthropies that we supported and were close to our hearts," says Nancy. "I love to entertain. Having small dinner parties is my favorite, but I also enjoy the larger events."

Situated on five acres in the shadow of Camelback Mountain, the Mediterranean-inspired country house is designed for both family fun and fabulous fêtes. "Having the right space for entertaining was very important for the Hanleys. That's why they chose this lot," says architect and *Phoenix Home & Garden Masters* of the Southwest award winner Mark Candelaria. Originally, the couple planned to build on a hillside lot, but a

year into the project, Lee decided that a more level property would better fit their needs. "It's a bigger lot. They can park cars a lot easier. Guests can come and go much easier. And all of the outdoor spaces we created give them different venues for different types and different sizes of events," Candelaria adds.

For example, the refined dining room modeled after a Scottish conservatory is ideal for private meals for 12. Glass bifolding doors surround the room, allowing the space to become one with the outside and giving the illusion of dining in the middle of a country garden. In the

stately living room, filled with antiques, artworks and collectibles the couple had gathered over many years, a wall of glass doors opens to a large patio and expansive grass lawn that's framed by hedges of white iceberg roses.

The couple has hosted numerous gatherings in the yard, including a large housewarming party to thank everyone who worked on the home and a family wedding. On the east side of the house, sheltered from the



afternoon sun's scorching rays, is an outdoor barbecue area—as well as the guest casita and pool—that's also the perfect spot for an early evening cocktail reception.

"What I try to do is create different ways to experience a house, not only in terms of size of space but also orientation of space," says Candelaria. "A lot of times, we'll create spaces on the left of the house so you can use them in the morning or take in the sunset. With this house, there are a lot of spaces on the east to take in the shade. Then there's that beautiful


terrace with a big fireplace that transitions you from the inside living area to the lawn. It's nice because you can really experience the property a variety of ways."

That sense of openness and of sharing that the Hanleys required manifested on a warm evening in May, when Nancy opened the home for a once-in-a-lifetime private concert by world-renowned pianist Yuja Wang. The event, a special fundraiser benefiting The Phoenix Symphony, welcomed 80 guests plus dozens more staffers to the property.

Guests arrived through a large antique iron gate near the outdoor kitchen, where preshow cocktails and hors d'oeuvres were served. The performance took place in
